## LESSON 2: CREATIVE NONFICTION/ PERSONAL ESSAY CLASS NOTES

## WHAT IS CREATIVE NON-FICTION?

*Creative nonfiction* (also known as literary nonfiction or narrative nonfiction) is a genre of writing that uses literary styles and techniques to create factually accurate narratives.

A *personal essay* is a form of creative non-fiction where the author's personal experience forms the foundation of the piece. Unlike a journalistic piece, the author is front and center in the story.

## Why write creative nonfiction?

- Presents facts in an engaging way
- Emotional engagement
- Personal attachment to the author

## 7 Elements of the Essay

- 1. The personal presence of the author
- 2. An engagement between the self and the world
- 3. The author's self-exploration and self-discovery
- 4. The need to both show and tell
- 5. Veracity/Authenticity
- 6. Mutability of form
- 7. A sense of intellectual plot, quest, engagement, or payoff

Think of the personal essay like a Russian Doll in reverse: You start with the small, your own personal experience or perspective, and expand outwards.



Create an outline for a creative nonfiction essay. Use the following questions to help develop your idea.

- How can I present this idea in a creative way, using a scene, dialogue, or other components?
- What is my unique commentary on the scene (opinion, realization, analysis)?
- What does it mean in the larger context?
- How is the idea/experience/opinion changed or deepened from what it was in the beginning?

**Optional:** If you're feeling extra adventurous, try creating the opening paragraph. Use your skills of "showing" that we learned the previous lesson to set the stage for the narrative.

**Tip:** Remember the personal exploration component of the essay. Pick a topic or idea that you have some sort of personal connection to—something that you are interested in exploring in yourself, something that strikes a chord with you emotionally.
